About TRAC:

Therapeutic Riding At Centenary (TRAC) provides equine-assisted services (EAS) for individuals with special needs and develops EAS-Industry leaders. TRAC is recognized as a Premier Accredited Center by the Professional Association for Therapeutic Horsemanship International (PATH Intl.). The program was founded in 2003 by Dr. Octavia J. Brown, CU Professor Emerita, and since 2020, has been directed by Karen Brittle, Assistant Professor of Equine Studies.

- All services are subsidized, and additional scholarship support is provided to over 50% of TRAC participants. Veterans and immediate military family members participate free of charge.

Participant updates:

- TRAC serves 25 riders each week, and an additional 60+ individuals annually through special programs and camps. This year, 16 veterans and 2 military family members participated.
- We serve individuals with learning or developmental disabilities, emotional health challenges, and traumatic brain injuries. We also serve people with Down syndrome, multiple sclerosis, visual and hearing impairments, and physical challenges.
- This year, we expanded our equine-assisted learning programs to meet a significant community need for services that address overall wellness and emotional well-being.

Training and education updates:

- The Equine Studies Department offers the degree track, BS: Equine Studies, Therapeutic
 Horsemanship Management as well as a Minor in Therapeutic Riding Instruction.
 Students are preparing to become PATH Intl. Certified Therapeutic Riding Instructors
 (CTRI) and/or Equine Specialists in Mental Health and Learning (ESMHL).
- Recent graduates have procured program positions at Loudoun Therapeutic Riding,
 Mane Stream, Pony Powers of NJ, Ivy Hill Therapeutic Equestrian Center, and TRAC!
- TRAC offered four comprehensive internships to Centenary University students this year, three of which were paid positions and one of which was for academic credit.

Volunteer program updates:

- This year, volunteers contributed more than 4,000 hours (market-place value of over \$133,960).
- Volunteers range in age from 15 75 and include undergraduate and graduate students, alumni, high school students, veterans, and local community members.

Herd and facility updates:

- An anonymous donor generously supported the purchase of Frankie for the TRAC program. Frankie is a western-trained Paint gelding whose qualities support our program needs!
- Generous donations and grant support have allowed renovations to improve the accessibility and comfort of TRAC's viewing and mounting areas.
